Trail Maintenance & Construction =



Technology Team

We've been isolating but that doesn't mean we're not volunteering. This becomes obvious when we look at long term reporting trends.



This graph shows the number of hikes reported by Trail Patrol since the system was put in place in September 2016. The calendar year of 2020 was a banner year - we exceeded 3000 hikes. Interestingly, the lines show that the average number of hikers and bikers encountered per patrol report dropped compared to previous years. This probably indicates that we often avoided the busiest trails.

The next two graphs show the number of signage and graffiti repairs completed since 2019. Again, we see in 2020 was a highly productive year. We were able to continue maintenance work while working independently in both these areas. These teams use phone apps to find the location of reports, plan their repairs, and document completed work.

Wildlife Projects:

FOF Volunteer Dave Kennedy is shown putting the finishing touches recently on the relocation of an American kestrel nest box at Rogers Tank at Duff Flats north of Forest Road 258. The box was relocated from a nearby site to this one where it is hoped the trees will provide some cooling shade. Erection and monitoring of the nest boxes are one of the host of wildlife/fish/rare plants projects coordinated by Janie Agyagos, Red Rock Ranger District Wildlife Biologist. They are also part of a research and conservation program called the American Kestrel Project (AKP). The Arizona Game and Fish Department has taken the lead in establishing a network of partners to build, place and monitor the boxes throughout the state. The goal is to provide breeding habitat for America's smallest and most colorful falcon, which is suffering a decline. Ferocious hunters, kestrels are found from Alaska to South America. They dine on insects, small rodents, reptiles and other birds. Volunteers visit the boxes during breeding season to record the presence of eggs and young and again in winter to clean them and replace bedding. Information obtained is uploaded to the AKP website.



Cultural Resources

Nearly all activities for the Cultural Resources Committee continue to be shut down due to the pandemic. A few tasks that are either solitary in nature or involve just a spouse and/ or hiking dog have managed to continue.

Awards and Accolades

The Cultural Site Photo Documentation team is the recipient of the **2020 Cultural Heritage Award** given by Keep Sedona Beautiful. Congratulations to the team for on this well-deserved award!! (More details elsewhere in the newsletter)

Four FoF members (Spence Gustav, Scott Newth, Jerry Walters, and Rick Zabor) were among 30 Coconino National Forest volunteers that have been "recognized by the Chief of the Forest Service for their dedication to archaeology projects throughout the forest" — "Working Together Preserving the Public Lands Legacy". Each recipient volunteered over 1,000 hours over multiple years to archaeology projects that directly support of the Forest Supervisor's Office (i.e., Coconino Forest Archaeologist). Each recipient received a certificate personally signed by the Chief of the Forest Service.


KSB award to Cultural Resources Photo Team

Graffiti Removal

One might make the argument that as the cases of COVID increase, the tourists and hikers on the trails would decrease - and you would be wrong! Just the opposite seems to be the case. Sedona and the Coconino National Forest area continues to attract tourists in greater numbers than ever. Certainly, no surprise to those of us hiking any of the trails.

In an attempt to keep up with the ever-increasing new graffiti, we keep making procedural changes to the Graffiti Removal Team. Because of COVID, we are still limited in going out as married couples or individuals, among the other restrictions. Fortunately, there have been no major paint sites, which would require a team effort. Scratchings on the rocks (for those who wish to become (in)famous - at least until we get there) still, by far, are taking up most of our time, 150-200 hours per month.


Because we have also seen an increase in spray paint and stickers on signs, steel containers, utility boxes, trail head markers, pipes, restroom walls, etc., we recently purchased more "Orange Safety Spray #2" and smaller dispenser bottles with spray nozzles. With some additional training, we have given these added tools to some of our more experienced team members and are getting to these locations much quicker.


